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Episode Description

Side effects are one of the most challenging and under-discussed aspects of living with lung cancer. In this episode, host Annabelle Gurwitch and advocate Colette Smith share powerful stories about navigating treatment side effects, doctor-patient communication breakdowns, and the invisible challenges that persist long after treatment ends.

Colette, diagnosed with Stage 1A lung cancer 10 years ago, continues to face chronic breathing difficulties and pain from surgery. Annabelle, living with stage IV EGFR+ lung cancer, discusses severe TKI side effects that her doctor initially dismissed, and how she discovered dosage flexibility that changed her quality of life.

Action Steps



For Patients & Caregivers:

- Report ALL side effects to your oncologist, even uncomfortable ones
- Ask about dosage adjustments if side effects are severe
- Keep a side effect journal with dates and severity
- Seek second opinions when concerns are dismissed
- Join online patient communities for support
- Explore complementary therapies with your care team
- Allow yourself pleasures and find joy

For Healthcare Professionals:

- Create safe space for patients to report all side effects
- Proactively discuss dosage flexibility
- Connect patients with mental health resources early
- Validate that early-stage patients face real challenges
- Recognize anxiety and scanxiety as normal parts of survivorship
